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REIBA FATIMA MISSION - BOLIVIA

We kick off this month's NotiREIBA by sharing that, as part of Mission Fátima, we held a visual arts workshop on **Saturday, July 12th**. Artist Berna Rivera, daughter of Tsimane leader Justina Canchi, spent a few days meeting with the community's children, helping them develop their hands and imagination.



Berna has lived in Spain since she was a child, and during these months in her hometown, she and her mother are helping us design the knowledge booklets. She has also helped the sisters with the children's catechism classes on Sundays. We thank Berna for her dedication.



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On **July 19**, a drawing and poetry workshop was held using booklets containing drawings of animals native to the Tsimane world. The children practiced fine motor skills by coloring. A special moment was also shared through poetry.



This activity was carried out with volunteer Nery and Ms. Berna Rivera in the meeting room of the NGO Bolivian Medical Solidarity.

From **July 13 to 18**, we carried out activities that will help us recover Tsimane songs, all within the framework of the ecological calendar project.





This is how we visited the community's wise men and women, who shared songs for different environments of daily life, such as water, the home, the farm, and the forest.



These collected songs will be shared in scheduled school sessions. This is intended to prevent the total loss of this cultural treasure that characterizes the Tsimane people.




REIBA SAN ANTONIO DE LOMERIO - BOLIVIA

REIBA DICARO - ECUADOR

As REIBA Dicaro, we are pleased to share with you that on Tuesday, **July 1st**, we welcomed volunteer Sofía from Guayaquil to continue supporting the eight Salesiana students this month. These students are in their final month before the end of their semester. Although time is short, we know her help and contribution will be invaluable to the young people.

On **July 11**, we were delighted to receive a visit from **Sister Alba Teresa**, Superior General of the Lauritas Sisters, and **Sister Consuelo**, who is a member of the Ecuador Province Board of Directors. The entire group of young students sang a welcome song in Waotdedo, introduced themselves, and told them about their studies and the great work the Lauritas Sisters are doing in Dicaro.



On the morning of **July 12th**, we met at the women's cultural center to introduce the sisters to the Waorani culture. The ecotourism students presented the Chambira craft project, and finally, we concluded the meeting with a traditional food tasting: wonton stew.

In the afternoon, Sister Marlene and the volunteers met with the sisters, sharing our experiences on the mission.



On **Sunday morning, July 13th**, we met as we do every Sunday to share the Word of God. The sisters were present and shared a brief reflection on the day's Gospel. After the celebration, they left for Pompeii to begin their return journey.

On **July 15th**, we received a visit from **Father Peter, Armando**, and **María Dolores** from **Jesuit Worldwide Learning**. They came to see the students' progress regarding the English scholarship and the ecotourism studies the four students are completing. They also visited the project to see the construction of the women's house and the university center.

On **July 16**, the feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, we began with the Eucharist, then descended upon the land where we dream of the university center being. Our visitors were filled with hope by our commitment to the education of young people in the Amazon and the promotion of a future that respects, values, and preserves the traditions, culture, and language of the Waorani people.



Finally, we went down to the women's house for the presentation of the young women's ecotourism projects. Student Sandra Tocari presented her crafts project, Laura Bahigua presented the tourism project of the Ayebe association, Magaly Tega presented ancestral medicine, and Targelia Enataque presented ancestral beauty products. These projects have been developed, structured, and implemented throughout the three modules of the course.

We thank God for the presence of Father Peter, Armando, and María Dolores, who are signs of hope for our community and whose quiet and discreet support is helping to build a future woven with the dreams and hopes of young Waorani people.



DREAMING OF A CHURCH WITH AN AMAZONIAN FACE

On Sunday, **July 20th**, in **Mission Fátima (Bolivia)**, following the celebration of the Word, we began a series of talks under the theme "Let's take care of our common home and our health." These meetings will be informative for the community, focusing current and regional issues such as environmental care, public health, and other topics like the use of mercury in water resources and emerging diseases. This will be done through the screening of documentaries and presentations. The first meeting, led by Dr. Javier Flores, director of the community health center, focused on measles as an emerging disease.



On Monday, **July 21**, in **el Coca (Ecuador)**, we participated in the Eucharist commemorating the 38th anniversary of the martyrdom of **Monsignor Alejandro Labaka** and **Sister Inés Arango**. It was a moment of renewed faith and the missionary spirit that drove them to give everything, even their lives.

It was concelebrated by **Cardinal Luis Gerardo Cabrera Herrera, OFM**, of Guayaquil, along with other bishops and priests who came to join in the celebration. During the homily, we were strongly encouraged to turn our gaze to Jesus to find the meaning of our lives, just as Alejandro and Inés did.



After Thanksgiving Mass, we went to share lunch and witness a cultural event, which featured student **Maicol Coba**, who began the celebration with a song.



Also present were artists Roxana Tanguila and Juan Morales, and of course, dances from the Kiwchua, Shuar, and Afro-Ecuadorian nationalities.

On **July 1**, REPAM, CEAMA, and REIBA discussed the future location of REIBA's office in Manaus, with the possibility of inheriting materials from the REPAM office.



On **July 6**, we participated in the inauguration of **the Tukano Language Cultural Center in the Branquinho Indigenous Village, Manaus**. This will be a key space for the community to preserve the cultural richness and traditions of the Tukano people.



During the event, cultural dances were performed, traditional foods were shared, handicrafts were sold, and the Word was celebrated.

On July 10, the **“Lua Verde Cultural Center”** of the **Kokama** people in Manaus was visited.



This is a space offered to Indigenous families living in the urban area of Manaus for the recovery and revitalization of the **Kokama** language. It will also serve as a place for the preservation and revitalization of their culture.


We thank each of them for continuing to weave the web together with joyful hearts and a willingness to share the gifts freely received.

On **July 18**, the traveling team, Fe y Alegría-Colombia represented by Sabrina Burgos, REIBA, represented by Sister Marbelis Monroy and Sister Claudia Ximena, who carried out the mission last month, were in charge of traveling the triple border of Brazil-Venezuela-Colombia with a view to providing closer accompaniment to the brothers and sisters living in that region, both in pastoral and educational aspects. The report of this mission was presented to Bishop Joselito Carreño of the Apostolic Vicariate of Inírida, Marcelo Lemos, executive secretary of CEAMA, Sister Martha Ardila, general coordinator of REIBA Colombia, and Ana Gabriela Jiménez of the EIB/Communication Commission of REIBA.

In this report, Father Fernando Sj. and Sabrina Burgos discussed how this team was formed, its objective, the information they gathered from all the communities they visited last month, and the needs of each one.

After the report presentation, there was a space for discussion, sharing concerns, and planning the next steps together (REIBA-CEAMA, FÉ Y ALEGRÍA, and the bishops of the BR-CO-VZ tri-border area) to gradually achieve the stated goal.

REIBA plans to provide training to indigenous teachers through advisors to help them recover their knowledge.





During this month, students were able to complete presentations that allowed them to express themselves to the public, following some guidelines given by the advisor, such as: the initial greeting, the presentation and explanation of what was being exhibited, as well as questions and thanks.

Lic. Sandra recommended that the initial presentation of any presentation they must give, not only at the university but also in other venues, be done in both Spanish and their native language to make the audience understand the speaker's background.



During the presentations, the students elegantly displayed their traditional costumes and their love for environmental care through drawings and allusive phrases.





